An English Language Fellow (ELF) programme started on 11 July, 2023 wherein students get an opportunity to acquire English Language skills from a professionally-trained in person fellow from the US who stays on campus. Ms. Shannon Dee Smith, the English Language Fellow from Colorado, USA trained the students to improve their English language skills and gain confidence to compete for the job market or higher studies. Shannon trained 218 students of III BA, B.Com, BMS & BBA from 11 July to 24 October, 2022. Students were trained in a 20 hour course English for Gender Equality which included themes of women's empowerment. This course helped the students to improve their English communication skills for success with future studies or employment goals and helped them realize the need of women empowerment and created an awareness about the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

The college is fortunate to get Shannon's extension for the ELF programme from January 2023 to May 2023. The ELF program for I MBA students was conducted from 18 Jan to 10 Feb, 2023. 24 students benefitted from the course titled English Language Speaking Skills. The course was conducted every Monday to Friday from 3.00 to 4.00 pm. Students received certificates at the end of the course.

A ELF program for the I UG students started on 27 February, 2023. Interested students of I UG had a diagnostic English test and were divided into Advanced and Lower levels for their classes. Two I UG batches of 43 students (Batch I: 21 & Batch II: 22) attended the virtual classes twice a

week from 3.00 to 4.00 pm. The course titled Sustainable English for Academic Purposes ended on 19 May, 2023 and the students received certificates from the US government upon the completion of the course.

On the other hand, 31 II MBA students attend the virtual classes thrice a week from 11.40 am to 12.40 pm. The title of the course was Sustainable English for Academic Purposes. The course ended on 19 May 2023. They too received certificates from the US government upon the completion of the course.

The college is thankful to the Regional English Language Office, American Embassy, New Delhi for their support. We look forward to a long, strong and fruitful association with the U.S. Consulate General.



Healthy leadership starts with a healthy mindset. Realizing the importance of the right mindset for the leaders, IQAC organised a half day workshop for the leaders and students on 20-09-2022 from 10.00 a.m. to 12.30 p.m. in the A.V. Room.

The programme began with a formal inauguration in the presence of Administrative Officer Dr.Sr.Leena Quadras. III B.Com TPP students sang a melodious prayerful song and invoked God's blessings after which Dr.Sr.Leena Quadras welcomed the gathering and wished the students to be responsible for their own life.

The resource person Mr.Siva Sankar, IIT, Chennai internationally acclaimed expert dealt at length some of the facts related to brain and its functions. He asked the students who controls them. They said each person controls one's own life. But they could not say how it is done. He explained in detail that Mind is a leader, brain is a manager and organs are staff. Therefore, each one is responsible for her destiny. He also showed video clippings of how a teenager's brain works. Teenager's mind works 30 times faster than adults. Right brain is for creativity and the left brain is for logic. Students were given an exercise to identify which side of the brain is most active. There was a lot of excitement after the exercise.





Later he touched upon Yoga and pranayama as tools to control one's mind. He also explained about the conscious and sub-conscious mind and how sub- conscious mind can become an asset if only we use it for our well-being. Some students suffering from Migraine Headache asked for

some remedies. He said before going to bed to calm the mind and instruct it with good health prayer slowly after 21 days of practice the visible results will be seen.



ENGLISH ACCESS MICROSCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

A Two Year Program (1 July 2022 to 28 February 2024)

Commencement of Classes: 29 August 2022

Launch of Program: 13 October 2022

The English Access Microscholarship Program at Maris Stella College is a unique initiative aimed at students with low English communication skills. Sponsored by the U.S. Department of State and U.S. Embassies, this student-centered program provides English language skills to underserved students worldwide, primarily those aged 13 to 20, through extracurricular classes and activities. The program offers participants a foundation in English language, leadership, professional skills, and exposure to U.S. culture and democratic values, potentially enhancing their job and educational prospects.

The objectives of the Access Program are to equip students with effective English language communication and critical thinking skills through meaningful interaction, cooperative and student-centered learning strategies, interest and age-appropriate activities, and real-life applications. The service-learning component of the program increases students' awareness of issues in their communities and empowers them to positively contribute to civil society.

The agreement between Maris Stella College and the U.S. Department of State, Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs, was signed on 28 June 2022, covering a two-year period from 1 July 2022 to 28 February 2024. Dr. K. Naga Sundari, Head of the Department of MBA, serves as the Coordinator, with Dr. Sr. Ramana K., Dean of Student Affairs, as the Deputy Coordinator. They actively publicized the program within the college, particularly targeting first-year degree students of all groups in April and May 2022.

Subsequently, they conducted a written test using the Cambridge English test and an oral exam, selecting 55 students from the 120 who applied. The program allows for the participation of only 50 students, with an additional 5 attending as audit students, ready to replace any student who drops out. The program is divided into 7 quarters, each lasting three months. Before each quarter, a budget report must be prepared and forwarded to Family Health International, responsible for financial disbursement. Additionally, a completion report is to be submitted at the end of every quarter.

The total approved fund for the program is 50,000 USD. For the slection of teachers an official advertisement was published in the local regional daily and in "The Hindu," and it was also posted on our college website. The interview panel, consisting of U.S. Consulate Access Program Consultant Mr. Thirupathi Senthil, US Consulate, Hyderabad, and Ms. Rachana Sharma, Program Manager at the Regional Language Office (RELO) in Delhi, selected Ms. Praveen and Ms. Divya, both with Post Graduate qualifications in English Literature, from the nine candidates who attended the interview.

The official program launch occurred on 13 October 2022, in the presence of Ms. Jennifer Larson, U.S. Consul General, Hyderabad, and Mr. David Moyer, Public Engagement Officer. However, classes commenced on 29 August 2022. Since then, students have been progressing through lessons organized by quarters.

Every day from Monday to Friday, classes are held from 4.15 pm - 5.15 pm, and on Saturday, two hours from 1.30 pm -3.30 pm. Per week, seven hours of classes are conducted. A total of 780 instruction hours are to be completed during the entire program. Special consideration to the needs of the students is given in this program. Students are given snacks every day before starting their classes so that they do not attend classes hungry. Travel allowance or vehicle arrangement is done to reach students' homes who are in need of transportation.



FIRST QUARTER: JULY-SEPTEMBER 2022

In the inaugural quarter of the English Access Microscholarship Program, students at Maris Stella College engaged in diverse and interactive learning experiences focused on enhancing their English language skills and fostering holistic development.

1. Language Acquisition through Creative Methods:

• The primary focus during this quarter was on teaching parts of speech through innovative methods, including songs, story-telling, pictorial descriptions, and interactive games such as the "pass the ball" activity.

- Students acquired practical knowledge on incorporating different parts of speech into their regular conversations, reinforcing their understanding through worksheets that assessed their learning outcomes.
- The utilization of varied teaching techniques enabled students to create charts and present information with confidence, promoting effective communication skills.

SECOND QUARTER: OCTOBER 2022 – DECEMBER 2022

The second quarter of the English Access Microscholarship Program at Maris Stella College was marked by a comprehensive exploration of American culture, engaging activities to foster critical thinking, and initiatives aimed at enhancing students' physical and mental wellbeing.

1. Introduction to American Culture:

- Through a series of videos, students were introduced to various facets of American culture, including work culture, urban vocabulary, weather, and seasonal clothing names.
- The exploration extended to a city called Astana, where students learned about its unique aspects through informative tracks and videos.

2. Activities for Critical Thinking:

- Activities such as inkblot, jackets (don't judge a book by its cover), and outer space were conducted to develop critical thinking skills.
- The outer space activity encouraged students to create visually appealing charts, fostering creativity and effective communication.


The Language Partnership Programme (LPP) specifically targeted the first and second-year undergraduate students during the odd semester. Following the Continuous Assessment I (CAI) in General English, students were classified into two groups: slow learners and advanced learners, based on their CAI marks.

In the academic year 2022- 23 over 100 students from I & II UG benefited through this course. The course started in the month of September. The entire faculty from the department of English was involved in this program

The selected slow learners attended LPP classes from 3 pm to 4 pm, Monday to Friday. These classes focused on improving their communication skills through various activities involving listening, speaking, reading, and writing. To facilitate effective learning, the slow learners were divided into small groups and had received assistance from advanced students in improving their communicative abilities.

The teacher played a crucial role in coordinating the activities and ensuring that the slow learners actively participated. With the help of the advanced learners, each slow learner was closely supervised and guided throughout the program. The LPP curriculum spans 30 hours, and by the end of this program, students' performance is evaluated based on their progress and skills demonstrated in the semester-end examinations.

ENGLISH FOR COMMUNICATION 2022-23

As the second language, English has been taught in India since primary education but Indian students are unable to speak English fluently even after the completion of higher education. In spite of their proficiency in written English, they cannot be good communicators orally. This is because of the lack of practice in the use of English for oral communication. Besides, their accent also varies from the speakers of English with native accent. As there are wide job prospects today for those who have fluency in English, this becomes a major problem for the job aspirants and also those working with multi-national companies. Even for those working with Indian companies, English is the only means of communication for Indians speaking different Indian languages.

The Service Learning Course 'English for Communication' offered by Dept. of English is designed to cultivate interest in the young students in their formative years in speaking in English. 17 Sem III students of HELP & HELT have chosen this course. Students of eighth standard of Boyapati Siva Rama Krishnayya Muncipal High School, Near Jammichettu, Vijayawada have been selected for this project to test whether they acquire the communicative ability in English with good exposure and practice.

- To develop targeted interventions and policy recommendations aimed at promoting healthier eating habits and sustainable street food practices, considering the socio-economic context and preferences of urban consumers in Vijayawada.

Activities

This project explores street food buying habits in Vijayawada, focusing on areas like Gurunanak Nagar road, NH16 service road, and Nirmala convent road, reflecting local food culture. Students went to the above said places and met the street food vendors and made survey of these food outlets.

- They collected information about these vendors and their food items being sold.
- They made them aware about the importance of hygiene in food processing.
- They persuaded them to properly cover the food and use gloves.
- They enlightened them on the bad consequences of adulterated food
- They persuaded them to use biodegradable plastics.


Outcomes

- Improved overall well-being by educating the people on preventive aspects of communicable diseases.
- Decreased transmission of vector-borne diseases like malaria, dengue fever, and Zika virus by providing guidance.

Activities

For the study students chose the nearby area known as Christurajapuram.

- They organized a survey and conducted an awareness program in Christurajapuram to address the issue of civic health care, specifically focusing on communicable diseases.
- The survey covered 152 families to find out the prevalence and extension of communicable diseases.
- The root causes of communicable diseases were open defecation, poor hygiene practices, and water stagnation in the locality.
- Through the awareness program, students emphasized the importance of proper sanitation, discouraging open defectaion, using boiled water for consumption, and always covering the food.
- They conveyed the message that maintaining personal cleanliness and a clean environment contributes to good health, joy, peace, and prosperity.



Survey Responses



Reflections

- Out of one hundred and fifty two families, even after adapting different measures to
 prevent both the spread of mosquito and the disease, people were still affected with
 malaria.
- Out of 152 families 170 members were affected by malaria followed by diarrhea and dysentery.
- There are no cases of Filariasis found in the surveyed area.
- Some people are not aware of safety practices due to unwillingness to change.
- The stagnant water serves as a breeding ground for various mosquito species.

• It is crucial for the community to collaborate in creating a clean and safe environment by eliminating mosquitoes and addressing unfavorable conditions that contribute to the spread of communicable diseases.

Recommendations

- Cultivate good hygiene habits by engaging in daily bathing and maintaining litter-free surroundings.
- Toilets to be constructed for the families lacking them.
- Advocate for the consumption of only treated water—boiled, filtered, or purified.
- Minimize contact with fecal matter and use sandals to protect feet.
- Take care of common areas where exposure to disease-causing agents is possible.
- Implement effective pest control measures both in personal living spaces and community areas.
- Promote awareness about the significance of using toilets and adopting proper waste disposal practices.
- Collaborate with Municipal Corporations and NGOs dedicated to promoting a disease-free India and Swachh Bharat initiatives.

Outcomes

- Assumed collective responsibility for a clean and green environment, fostering harmony and health in the community.
- It is incumbent upon us to uphold not only our individual well-being but also the civic health of surroundings.
- Implementation of proper sanitation, recycling initiatives and efficient disposal of waste for prevention of stagnation.
- Judicious urban planning to prevent the conversion of fertile lands into concrete expanses.

Activities

A total of 10 Degree students from B.Sc.(FMBC) have done their Service Learning Project Health in Nutrition for the academic year 2022-23. The duration of the course is 30 hours and the credits given are 1. The students have collected data from middle aged people who are sedentary workers from various areas of Vijayawada with the help of the supervisors of the concerned areas. From the data, it is evident that:

- More than 50% of people are not having a proper knowledge about nutrition to be given to the pregnant ladies.
- Most of them are not having proper nutritious food during pregnancy which are leading to many problems during childbirth.
- Many people from Kapileswarapuram are not aware of the nutritious food to be given as a supplement to their children. There are many children who are underweight and they are also undernourished and the growth in many children is stunted. From RTC colony, Vijayawada
- From the data it is evident that 40% of middle aged people are not aware of hygiene practices to be followed. They are not properly maintaining their surroundings, and most of them are throwing garbage in the nearby areas.

- Many are not aware about junk foods limits to be taken.
- They have explained to them the importance of health and hygiene practices to be followed to live a healthy and safe life.
- They have also encouraged them to follow and practice hygiene.
- They explained to them about the nutritious foods which could be brought at affordable prices and the foods which are locally available and also the nutrients found in the foods which are available seasonally.


Fig 2: Hospital Survey on contagious diseases


Survey Results:





Brief Report:

The Department of Computer Science & The IQAC organized a state-level webinar on "Revolutionizing Connectivity: An Introduction to the Capabilities of 5G Technology" was organized by the Department of Computer Science & the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) on 25-02-2023. The webinar was held in the auditorium from 11:30 am to 1:00 pm. The event started with a prayer song by Ms. Meghana from II MPCS, followed by a welcome address by Ms K. H. Anuhya, Vice principal. Sr. Sujitha, lecturer in Computer Science introduced the resource person for the webinar Ms. Neeraja Danthuri, Program Manager at Intel Corporation, Hyderabad. The webinar was attended by a total of 425 students and 20 faculty members. During the session, Ms. Neeraja Danthuri gave an introduction to the history of 5G technology, highlighting its various generations and their capabilities. She explained that 5G is the fifth generation of wireless technology, and it is a significant improvement over previous generations in terms of speed and bandwidth.

Ms. Neeraja Danthuri elaborated on the advantages of 5G technology, which made everyone think about the real-world situations where this technology can be utilized. For instance, 5G download speeds are significantly faster than previous generations. Verizon's 5G Ultra Wideband (available

with select plans) is up to 10 times faster than Verizon 4G LTE. Additionally, 5G can bring a 10 to 100 times improvement over the existing 4G LTE technology. She explained the various technical aspects of 5G technology such as 5G Process and Flows, MIMO, 5G plan, 5G + ML + AI, and 5G Terminologies.

Moreover, Ms. Neeraja Danthuri also discussed the disadvantages of 5G technology with real-world examples. It is crucial to be aware of the potential drawbacks of any technology to make an informed decision about its adoption.

Overall, the state-level webinar provided an insightful introduction to 5G technology and its capabilities. It was a great opportunity for students and faculty to learn about the latest advancements in wireless technology and their implications for the future.
